The idea for the WT is born. The first issue was completed in one Sunday afternoon and mailed (in envelopes no less) to about 20 people on-line.

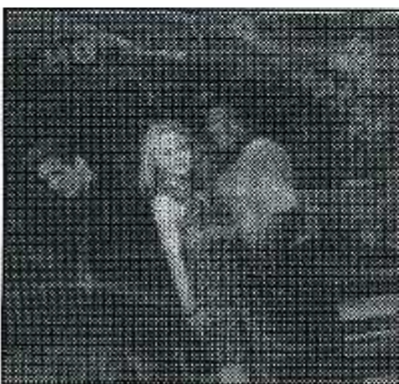


October, 1994
